A note from Pastor Chip



Dear Church Family:

Like almost everything these last nine months, Annual Meeting will look different this year. I know that we would all love to gather together, with the smell of chicken casserole hanging in the air, doing the business of the church and directing the future of our congregation, engaging in discussion and debate and discernment. Even though it is a stressful and busy time of year, it is also one of my favorite times: a time when we fully embody our call to collaborate with one another and come together as one body to decide among ourselves — with the assistance and guidance of the Holy Spirit — where God is calling Wilbraham United Church.

This year, Annual Meeting will not take place in Fellowship Hall. Nor will it take place in January. As we continue to adapt our practices in the face of the coronavirus, Governing Board is moving forward on a new path for this year's Annual Meeting. We are fully aware that there is nothing we can do that will fully replicate Annual Meeting, and no one way we can ensure the fullest participation of our community. That said, it is our goal to provide everyone with the opportunity to have their voice heard and make their vote count.

First: we will email the 2020 Annual Reports, including a Treasurer's Report and 2021 Budget to blessing to our community. I hope that we will all every member who has given us their email address. We will mail those same materials to those who we know do not have email — or those who specifically request a paper copy. We hope to have these ready for publication by January 27th.

Second: attached to the 2020 Annual Report, there will be a ballot featuring all the agenda items that require a congregational vote. You may mail it

back to the church, drop it off during office hours or at the January 30th Food Drive, or make an appointment with me, Rev. Paul, or Kim Neelans. If you have questions, you can contact us. We ask that all ballots be returned by February 6th.

Third: On February 7th, at 11:15 a.m., we are going to hold Annual Meeting via Zoom. It is our hope that we can combine the mail-in votes with those "present" at the meeting to achieve a quorum, confirm our slate of nominations. introduce the new committee structure, and pass a budget. Will it be easy? No. Will it go smoothly? God willing. Would we ever choose to do it this way? Not I, church; not I.

Lastly: When we are able to return to public, inperson worship, we will hold another Congregational Meeting to affirm the decisions we made at the February 7th meeting, to discuss the process by which these decisions were made, and — most importantly — finally share some chicken casserole together.

As we continue to walk this uncertain path and try to live into the future that God is calling us, I hope that we will continue to practice the extravagant welcome and exhibit the spirit of radical generosity that have been cherished and fundamental values to our congregation and a prayerfully and joyfully be of one mind in Christ, sharing in one Spirit, and one Body united in Christ even as we are distanced from one another. May God bless you, Wilbraham United Church, and our world.

A note from Rev. Paul

It has become a birthday custom in our house that the one who is celebrating will choose his favorite restaurant or meal for that particular day. On my 49th birthday (was it really almost ten years ago?) I told Mark that I wanted to go to Texas Roadhouse with our friends Donna and Christine. We chose the date and decided that we would gather at our house and I would drive us to the restaurant.

The day arrived; Mark and I prepared ourselves and sat in the living room with our pets to await the arrival of our friends. Donna, in her most punctual style, was the first to arrive but showed up carrying what could be a cake. "Oh good," I thought, "We will come back here for cake." I discovered it wasn't cake at all but was a salad. I was a bit perplexed by this but, then, others also began to arrive carrying bowls, and bags, etc. I turned to Mark and said, "What's going on?" He said, "Surprise! Bet you didn't think we'd do this for your 49th birthday." "You mean we aren't going to Texas Roadhouse?" I replied. The poor man just shook his head.

While it was not the plan that I expected, it turned out to be a wonderful evening for fun, food and merriment with great friends. Sometimes, life sends you surprises that are fun and others that are, well, not so much. These surprises, the bad and the good, infiltrate our lives to the point where we finally have to do something about them. Perhaps one of the most unpleasant "surprises" has been the pandemic.

This COVID-19 crisis has put many of us in numerous "surprising" positions. Could we have imagined on March 8, 2020 that it would be the last time we would be able to gather in our Sanctuary? Or that schools would close for the rest of the year and, in some cases, not open in the fall? It is not necessarily the case on how we do with surprises, but, rather, what we do in *response* to the surprises.

The responses of the Wilbraham United Church community have been fantastic! We have been leaders in the greater Wilbraham area in collecting food, school supplies and candy. Many members have come forward to help with these projects as we do what we can to bring forth God's reign on earth. We have also responded to calls for racial justice by allowing groups to use our lawn and many members joined the peaceful crowds who prayed together and listened.

Our church continues to deal with "surprises" as some have chosen to leave a ministry or a position that they've held. We are grateful for their service to our church. As our church has held its annual pledge drive, we have found that people are not in a position to give to the extent that they may have in the past. In the next few weeks, you will hear from various church leaders as we seek responses to these surprises. May our loving God continue to bless you and those whom you love. Peace and love,

2020 December and Annual Income Report Annual Pledge Income Budget: \$225,000 Pledge receipts through December: \$208,298 We thank you for your gifts.

Our 2020 fiscal year is now ended. We have spent much of the past year in self-imposed isolation in order to escape the peril of the global pandemic. With the roll-out of vaccines, we now have the hope of gradual relief in this new year. Pledge Income through December is \$208,298. This is about \$17,000 short of the pledge income we estimated in January. The shortfall is due to hardships, moves and deaths. Other church income sources were also seriously restricted or eliminated. Due to the quick and diligent work of Lisa Fallon and Joseph Stiefel, WUC received a PPP Loan, of which a forgivable portion amounting to about \$47,700 will help offset income deficits.

While we miss being together, the response to the worship events planned and so beautifully presented on Facebook by Pastor Chip, Reverend Paul, Mark and Deb, as well as the participation of church members, has been wonderful.

While 2020 has been a hard year for some of us, we all have known many blessings. While it now appears that the corona-virus restrictions will extend through mid-year, we now have the opportunity to share the many gifts that we have received. Have you returned your 2021 Pledge card? To date, pledges total only \$158,555, about \$101,000 short of what would be required to balance expenses requested by your Commissions and Committees. Too many have been "Same as last year". We are now trying to estimate 2021 pledge income and finalizing an income and expense budget to present to the 2021 Annual Meeting. Your response is critical. As you consider or reconsider your 2021 pledge, please prayerfully consider how you can help.

Thank you so much to all our faithful volunteers!






Outreach Commission is pleased to report that \$1528.00

Shopping Card Program Transitioning

As we enter a new year, we are reflecting on what makes the most sense, and what is the best use of our financial resources. Please be patient with us as we go through this process. For now, you may still count on having Big Y cards available (thank you to the many who have adapted to getting their cards in a different way!). This retailer is by far our most popular. We raise much needed funds for our church and support a local business—a win win!

As of now, we will be reducing, and potentially eliminating, our mail orders from Great Lakes Scrip for two reasons: it costs the church a minimum of \$8.50 in shipping each time we place an order for physical cards, and it creates more inventory which in turn ties up money that our church could use in other ways. Unfortunately, this includes Stop&Shop among others.

In a nutshell as we go through this transition, please keep buying Big Y cards, please consider buying e-cards through ShopWithScrip.com (this is a NO cost option for the church) as well as a new option of Ship to Home, and please be patient as we decide what's best for our church (and our team).




