A note from Pastor Chip



Dear Church Family:

As we prepare to enter Spring, the snow is still on the ground and there is a chill in the air. Every year at this time, we begin to think about the warmer weather and better days ahead in a different way. They suddenly seem so much closer, with the flipping of the calendar from February to March. If you are at all like me, as the days lengthen, you get a bit of a spring in your step and perhaps a little quicker with a smile.

This year, of all years, we have reason to hope for better things to come. It has been nearly a full year since we gathered in person in our sanctuary, in response to the coronavirus pandemic. As vaccination rates climb and infection rates fall, we can be cautiously optimistic that we will find ourselves in those once-familiar pews again. We can look forward to worshipping in our sanctuary again, if not exactly as we did before.

Because there is still so much that is unknown. and so much that is contingent, I am not comfortable announcing a date that we will reopen our doors. But please know that our new Church Council continues to monitor the numbers, our staff is constantly thinking about the practical procedures and precautions that we'll need to take, pitched in to ensure that our church community and we will be back together as soon as we believe we can accommodate people safely, with our customary extravagant welcome.

Until that time, we will continue to meet on Facebook Live and offer alternative ways of fellowship and community. On March 7th, we will have a virtual coffee hour on Zoom. It's never too late to join Tuesday night's Bible Study Happy Hour, as we learn about the Sermon on the Mount. I will continue holding office hours from 10-2 on

Wednesday and Thursday, while Paul offers his on Tuesday from 3:30-5 and Thursday from 5-7. Our Drive-by Drive on March 27th will not only be an occasion to drop off items for others, but a chance to pick up a palm for the next morning's Palm Sunday service.

For Holy Week, we will be offering two weeknight services on Facebook Live: Maundy Thursday and Good Friday, both at 7PM. On Holy Saturday, we would like to hold an Easter Vigil of sorts in the sanctuary, allowing one person at a time to sit and pray and reflect. If you would like to be a part of that, please email me. I need to gauge the interest in order to best plan for how we might make it work.

On April 4th, Easter Sunday, we invite you to a celebration of the resurrection, a worship service of Word and Sacrament, at 10AM on our front lawn. Again, details will be forthcoming, but it is our intent and our hope to welcome everyone to outdoor worship as we remember that Christ is Risen! Please stay tuned to your email for further updates and information as the date draws nearer.

Finally, my gratitude and my love to all who have has stated connected, and able to practice compassion, faith and love during this time of separation and isolation. We have learned so much about ourselves and the communities of which we are a part, and I hope that all of you feel as blessed as I feel by being a part of Wilbraham United Church.

Baked Potatoes and Cooked Carrots versus Dirty Snow and Mud



My mother, God rest her soul, was not among the world's greatest cooks and did not have a good meatloaf recipe. Also, every time we had this bad meatloaf, it was served with baked potatoes and cooked carrots that we all cooked for a very-long-time. Well, not only did I not like the meatloaf, I learned to dislike baked potatoes and cooked carrots. It took me a long time before I realized that cooked carrots and baked potatoes were not evil.

I think my love/hate relationship with the season of Lent has also been shaded by association. No, not with baked potatoes and cooked carrots but with dirty snow, mud, cold and trees that look dead. I have always thought that time period of late February and March was just dreadful. It took me awhile to realize that this was merely the calm before the spring and new life would come forth again.

One way to participate in that new life is to repent, not in sackcloth and ashes per se, but to repent from what keeps us from recognizing ourselves as one of God's beloved, much in the same way that God announced his love for the Son. Do we realize that WE are also God's beloved in whom God is well-pleased? Do we have some "dirty snow and mud" that keeps us from this part of a special relationship with God?

Dirty snow and mud become beautiful lawns and fields; dead trees come to life and mark the arrival of warmer weather. Our call to repent allows us to be transformed into better followers of Jesus who seek that new life that was promised in the Resurrection. I encourage all of us to take this time to repent and be transformed. It has been a long winter and even longer pandemic. Aren't we all ready to live fully again?

PLEDGE INCOME REPORT

This message is usually a pledge income report. This time, we need to talk about pledges.

As you know from the 2021 Budget presentation emailed to you and reviewed at annual meeting, we have an expense budget that exceeds expected income by about \$68,000, a troublesome deficit. To balance the budget, we would need \$264,056 of pledge income. Having analyzed 2020 pledge giving to estimate 2021 pledge income, we expect \$196,000 in pledge income. To date, we have \$171,315 pledged from 71 pledgers. The good news is that 12 of these pledgers have prepaid \$49,179 of the \$55,854 they pledged, providing early cash flow to pay expenses. The disturbing news is that nearly half of our member households do not pledge.

Deb Trimble, who has been working so artistically and diligently with Chip, Paul, Mark and Aimee to keep us connected, shared the following thoughts after she saw the data and offered to share them with all of us. We had 6 less pledges at that time.

"128 of you with your families consider yourselves to be members of the congregation. But only 65 of you are pledging. The rest of that number is 63 individuals or families. If each of those gave \$1000 for the year (that's less than \$20 per week) it would go a very long way to reducing the budget deficit. That would amount to \$63,000!!! With a deficit of \$68000 that leaves only \$5000!!! That's so much more doable than \$68,000.

Obviously, not everyone can afford \$20 a week. And some folks can afford more than that. We all need to do our part. It's important for everyone to pledge — even if it's \$5 a week. You'll find that once you start pledging it's easy to continue, and it also becomes easier to adjust that amount once you see how little it might impact your finances and how much you receive in return. It's particularly easy if you use online pledging. It becomes a regular expense that you don't have to worry about anymore, and the church benefits from having that steady stream of income, even if folks can't make it inside the building.

And for all those 'same as last year' folks — we need to remind them that the church's expenses aren't the same every year. Can they see it in their hearts to keep up with at least the same percentage that we used for staff salary increases? This year it is 1.3%, so if previously you gave \$1000 maybe now you give \$1013 (see how little that is!!!). Given that staff salaries are the largest part of our expenses and we want to reward the good work our staff is doing and continue to support them, we need to keep our pledging at least up to date with the cost of living. It's the right thing to do."

On behalf of the people served by the Mental Health Association (MHA), I am writing to express my thanks for your generous donations made recently to MHA. In particular, donations of winter coats are making this cold season warmer for individuals and families who are served through two MHA programs.

Our Tenancy Preservation Program (TPP) enables MHA to prevent evictions and homelessness, which is more important than ever in the extremely difficult environment created by the COVID-19 pandemic. Through TPP, MHA provides intensive case management, in consultation with the Housing Courts, to assess reasons for eviction, identify service needs, and develop plans to preserve housing and avoid homelessness.

Our GRIT Ridgewood program helps young men who are learning to stay sober, feel well and live their best life. Ridgewood is MHA's newest Residential Rehabilitation Services program for young men ages 18 to 26 with a co-occurring mental health and substance use diagnosis. There are 26 residential recovery programs in Massachusetts, but Ridgewood is the *only* one designed specifically for this underserved population. Our staff provide 16 young men who live here with the guidance, support and connections they need to move forward confidently in their lives.

Your kind and generous hearts are helping to make this important work this possible and keep the folks we serve warm through the winter. I just wanted to share how much we appreciate you. Thank you!



Easter is coming, and we have the opportunity to celebrate the Alleluia; to recognize that we live Alleluia lives.






